Annual Fundraising Dinner

Our annual fundraising dinner was held on April 13. Bill Lea, our guest speaker, is best known for photography of black bears, the Great Smoky Mountains, and the Florida Everglades. His long -held passion is capturing



photography subjects in "just the right light." Bill has authored three coffee-table books and co-authored others. His most popular book, Cades Cove – Window to a Secret World, is in its fourth printing and his newest book, The Everglades – Where Wonders Only Whisper, is now available. Photographing black bears for more than two decades has provided Bill with extraordinary opportunities to learn about bears, as well as to educate others to dispel the many myths and untruths about bears. Bill certainly educated the audience on bear behavior and shared many beautiful photographs of these important animals to our ecosystem.

On August 24, 2019, we held our first cash raffle fundraising event. Cash prizes totaled \$5,000. Thank you to everyone who bought tickets and made this a successful fundraiser. Even though we did not meet our goal of selling 1,000 tickets, it was a successful event and we are planning to hold another fundraising raffle in 2020—stay tuned for more details. The money raised has been put to good use on much needed maintenance—converting our lights to

LED, air conditioning unit repair, and water line replacement. We are still hoping to outfit the inside of our "new to us" van by insulating the walls and floors, adding an HVAC unit on the top and putting a logo wrap on the outside. Thank you for your continued support.

Fostering Those Too Young for Adoption

We have a limited number of approved individuals we call on to provide fostering of kittens and puppies who are too young for adoption. Ages range from a few days old to 8 weeks old. In 2019, 89 puppies from 19 litters were fostered by one Puppy Foster Momma Extraordinaire. One of the most interesting fostering observations was with the litter of heeler puppies who changed from white to red and blue (see photos to the right).

Through November 2019, we received more than 1,900 animals. Of those, more than 158 puppies and 206 kittens were less than 7 weeks old. This has been a very hectic year for all.

While preventing unwanted puppy and kitten litters by spaying and neutering is our ultimate goal, we thank the owners who keep litters with their mothers until weaned (at least 8 weeks) before surrendering them to the shelter. Early weaning has a number of negative effects on kittens and puppies—aggression, ability to speak dog/cat language, bite inhibition, shyness, training and discipline difficulties, and separation anxiety, to name a few.





Just a reminder that the Union County Humane Society is a non-profit, 501c(3) organization, open-admission shelter which is not county owned. This means we accept **ALL** animals from Union and surrounding counties that come to our door – whether dog, cat, bird, turtle, or other species; old or young; sick, injured, or healthy.

NO APPOINTMENT is necessary to surrender your pet or a stray animal. Our business hours are 10am – 4pm, Monday through Saturday.

NO FEE is required to surrender an animal; although donations are greatly appreciated to help us continue this service.

Bella-the Quirky Bulldog



In July 2019, a pitifully injured dog, Bella, was brought to our shelter. She suffered wounds inflicted by her owner who ran over her with a vehicle and failed to seek proper medical treatment. In addition to her wounds, she also had a large mass on her belly. Our veterinarian, Dr. Carson Hutchison, performed three surgeries on Bella to remove the mango-sized mass and clean and suture her wounds, including the two-inch laceration on her head that had exposed her skull.

Bella remained at the shelter for nearly four months while recuperating. Many of us came to love the quirkiness of this English Bulldog. She had her favorite toys (including squeaky pig), never passed up a butt rub, loved to chase the resident rooster, misbehaved every chance she got, and always expected her dehydrated lamb lung treat when she pottied outside.

At the end of October, Bella went to Smoky Mountain Bulldog Rescue where she is awaiting her new home. She does well with other dogs and cats, loves to play, and is a precious joy. You may email them at mdecuir@utk.edu if you are interested in adopting Bella or learning more about the Rescue.




2019 Ride Like an Animal
